This battle, one of the most significant battles in Tennessee in the early days of the Civil War, was near the Stones River in 1862. More than 24,000 soldiers—one in three—were killed, missing or wounded after the three day battle.

Interview with our Founding President—Ed Johnson

It was my pleasant duty and honor to have presented the Charter to the Mashville Section upon its establishment when I was the Southern Region Vice-President of MBCA!

When we thought about revamping the website and the newsletter, we also thought about how this all began. You know the sort of questions: what exactly was the genesis? Why did the founders start this club? And why has it continued for 34 years?

Who would know the answers? Well, maybe the three people who brought to life the idea of a Mercedes-Benz club in Nashville – the three who are still active members today: Ed Johnson, Tom Diehl, and Joel Morris.

In this edition of *The Circle and Star*, we talk to the Nashville Section's founding President, Ed Johnson.

The Circle and Star: How did the club get started?

Ed Johnson: Well, Tom Diehl and I were working together at Cain-Sloan in the late 70's. I was driving a 1962 220S Mercedes-Benz. Tom was admiring my car one afternoon as we were leaving, and he said, "if you ever find one like it, I'd like to have one." And I said, okay, I'll keep my eyes open.

Little did we know: two weeks later I found one. It was \$300. Turned out, it had belonged to a former schoolteacher of his in high school: Mrs. Cox. There's always a history with these things.

Well, Tom bought it, and over the next six months we had it repaired and improved so it ran even better. But we discovered the local Mercedes-Benz dealer really didn't seem too interested in helping us with the restoration. So I came up with the idea of starting an automobile club dedicated to Mercedes-Benz, thinking a group of us might be able to share ideas and present strength in numbers, so to speak.

We ran an ad in *Hemmings Motor News* and in *Road & Track* magazine advertising for members of the Mercedes-Benz Club of Nashville, and about three weeks later I got a call from Colorado Springs, Colorado. It was a Mr. Donn Wald, and he explained that there was already a Mercedes-Benz Club of America, and we could become affiliated with them. Sounded like a great idea to us.

C&S: So you decide start a club; what are the first steps?

Ed: We started talking about a club in early 1978, and on April 3, 1978 Volume 1 Number 1 of this newsletter went out to our group.

In the summer of 1978 we had an organizational meeting at the Cain-Sloan Steeplechase Room in Green Hills. Eighteen were at the meeting, and we signed a petition to be chartered as the Mercedes-Benz Club of America, Nashville Section.

I am delighted that three of you Charter Members are still active in the Club. - you. Tom Diehl & Joel Morris!

Our charter was granted on October 15, 1978. We had a meeting at the Jolly Ox, and Mr. Tom Sheppard, who was Southern Region Vice President of the Mercedes-Benz Club of America, presented the charter to us. We sent out a press release about it.

You know, I probably should mention that the current Mercedes-Benz dealer is supportive of our club!


C&S: Who were the first officers when the club began?

Ed: I was the President, Tom was Vice President, and Joel Morris was Secretary/Treasurer. And we're all still part of the club today.

C&S: What was your first Mercedes-Benz?

Ed: Actually, my brother Noel was the first in the family to own one. It was a 1958 180. It's still in the family—he still has it, still drives it.

My first was that '62 220S. I combined two of 'em for my first one. One was wrecked and the other was burned, so I put the good parts of both of them together. It was black with a red interior.



C&S: What initially attracted you to Mercedes-Benz?

Ed: The history and the heritage. Mercedes built the first car, regardless of what Henry Ford says. They are the first company to hold a patent on automobiles, in 1896. I figure, why not have the first and the best? The company's motto is and shall always be: the best, or nothing.

C&S: What do you remember most when you think of that first Mercedes-Benz?

Ed: A camping trip. I packed all the gear in the trunk and took my dog for a week camping at a farm in Sumner County. The trunk held everything for the whole week, and that car was rugged: it went down a dirt road that would have turned any other car into a piece of junk. It was durable and safe, and the maintenance was inexpensive and straightforward. I did most of it myself. Changed the oil, the water pump, the brakes, you name it. Gas was 78 cents a gallon, and it got 14 miles per gallon. Had six cylinders, and Solex dual carburetors.

At the time, that car was sort of a throwback to another era. Remember, this was the 70's. I wouldn't say it was the most beautiful car I ever owned, but it had a beautiful soul.

C&S: Would you like to have that car again?

Ed: Oh, yes. I sold it for \$1,600 in 1980, and bought a 1964 220SE coupe. The coupe was a very collectible car. I bought it for \$1,800 and spent \$5,000 restoring it.

C&S: What would you want to tell people about Mercedes-Benz?

Ed: If you want a good car, a Mercedes-Benz is an excellent choice. Plan to spend the most you can on one in good condition – the restoration can be expensive.

C&S: What would you want to tell people about the Mercedes-Benz club?

Ed: Membership in the club enhances your ownership experience. It increases your understanding, not only of your car, but of the history of Mercedes-Benz.

You, as the founding president, deserve recognition and honor for your work which brought about the birth of the first Section in Tennesee and to have been a principal force in fostering the growth and maintaining the vigor of the Section
